A Letter from the New SCF Superintendent, Craig Broeren ~ October 2024



Dear Saints Families-

Welcome to fall! This is my favorite time of year and I am reminded of why every time I step outside; the beauty of the St. Croix Falls area is unmatched particularly when it comes to the fall colors. This is also a sure sign of the changes yet to come in terms of weather as well as school operations. Students and staff are comfortably in "full swing" and we will be soon transitioning to the winter season; as a result, there are some relevant updates for the community to be aware of.

To begin, the District will be conducting its Annual Meeting and Budget Hearing on Monday, October 28 at which time the Board and taxpayers in attendance will be presented with a budget for the 2024-2025 school year. The Board will then take action to officially set the levy which is the last act to completely solidify the 2024-2025 budget. I realize that it may seem odd that Districts in Wisconsin are required to set their levies in October when our fiscal year begins on July 1; however, this is as a result of when Districts receive final data from the State necessary to complete and finalize the levy. There are three "moving parts" required each year beginning with the third Friday in September pupil count, followed by receiving equalized property values from the State in early October, and finally Districts receive their certification of State aid by October 15 per statute. Once these factors are known and certified, the Board is able to officially set the levy. It does appear as though we will be presenting a slight deficit budget for the 24-25 fiscal year due to the loss of ESSER funding (COVID money) available over the past two budget cycles. Unfortunately, when the legislature passed the 2023-2025 biennial budget, they relied on those ESSER funds as a source of revenue for school operations which did not completely account for the timing of the use of those funds available under statute. Districts had until September of 2024 to expend all of the ESSER funds and our District expended those funds last fiscal year (prior to June 30, 2024). That said, the projected deficit will be covered by fund balance available from last fiscal year due to the fact that since those ESSER dollars were claimed last fiscal year, we ended the 23-24 fiscal year with a slight surplus. This is good news; however, it also points to the importance of the legislature stepping up to better fund public education when developing the 25-27 biennial budget. More to come in that regard once the elections take place and the State legislature begins its budget work in earnest.

On a related note, you may be aware that as part of the Board's goals and our strategic plan, the District is focused on enhancing our approach to marketing, communications, and community engagement. To that end, the Board approved the creation of a new position, the Director of Marketing, Community Education, and Community Engagement, for the District when it approved a newly developed job description on September 24. The position was subsequently posted and we had several well qualified applicants apply; interviews will be conducted and an individual will be brought forward for consideration by the Board at a future meeting to fill this new position. This position, once filled, will be funded completely by Fund 80 (the "community" fund) which is levied for outside of the revenue cap and Fund 10 (the "general" fund). What this means is that the addition of this position will have NO impact on our budget for serving students including special education students. In short, the addition of this position will have no adverse fiscal impact on staff, students, or programming District-wide. The position will however, seek to improve communication and community engagement over time through active involvement and outreach in the community as well as social media and other relevant communication tools and activities.

Speaking of outreach, a huge THANK YOU to those who attended the STAR Foundation's taco bingo event as well as those who were able to join us at the Dairy Queen for the "meet and greet" with the administrative team and STAR Foundation members. Both of these events were a ton of fun and a lot of time and energy were invested by multiple individuals to benefit our students, staff, schools, and community. We are truly blessed to be in an area where many people are focused on our kids, our schools, and our community!

With respect to the winter season and weather, I wanted to alert you to a minor change that we intend to implement this school year. I am a firm believer in hard work and solid academics, but I am also a firm believer in kids being allowed to be kids. Starting this year, we will not require any off-site/ virtual work for students for the first TWO (2) school closure days; I feel there is significant value in retaining some of the "magic" for kids when they wake up to find there is "no school today". Their "assignments" on those first two days should be to play outside! Specific information regarding academic requirements after the first two closure days will be communicated to you by your child(ren)'s school(s) when and if they occur.

Please know that I do not take school closures lightly and I fully recognize the difficulty they pose for most of our parents; that said, the safety of our students and staff is paramount. I will do my best to balance the safety of our kids and family needs when making decisions to close schools due to weather. Communication regarding school closures will be as they have been in the past.

Best of luck to our fall sports teams as they either wrap up their season or head into tournament play! I also have to put a plug in regarding the Shrek musical slated for November 15th through the 17th; our kids and staff have been hard at work developing the set, practicing lines, and getting prepared overall. This is going to be an outstanding show!

GO SAINTS!

Lastly, I cannot express enough how awesome the student body is here. As you know, I have been involved in other Districts over the past 16 years and although there are awesome kids everywhere I have been, I can also say the SCF schools are unparalleled in that regard. This is due to you as parents as well as our dedicated and engaged staff members. This is an OUTSTANDING place.

Parents: This is a reminder on attendance.

Per our student handbooks, each student is allowed **ten** parent excused days each school year. A parent or guardian is required to notify the school when a child is absent from school. When taking a vacation, we require at least two days notification before being absent from school.

Students arriving late to school require a parental note or phone call and must sign in at the office window and receive a pass from one of the school secretaries for class. Being tardy for school beyond the time specified in your school's handbook will result in your student being marked absent. Accumulating multiple tardies, excused or unexcused, to any class, will result in detentions (for middle and high school students only).

Time is moving fast as we finish up the first quarter of the 2024-25 school year. As the new principal this year, one area of focus that we will be concentrating on is belongingness. It is no secret that the more involved (belonging) a student is with school, the more successful they will likely be. Currently, we have nearly 80% of our students involved in a club, group, sport, or activity. Along with student belongingness, I want to encourage parent involvement. Please keep in touch with teachers and coaches and reach out to the high school office with any questions. Utilizing PowerSchool is a great way to keep on top of student's grades and attendance.

Parent/teacher conferences were scheduled for the evening of October 17 and will also be held December 12th. If you wish to meet and speak with a teacher face to face, drop in. We appreciate the communication and dedication that parents can bring to our partnership.

We have had a great start to the school year with so many things going on at the high school. Our fall athletic teams have enjoyed great seasons. The football team appears to be heading deep into the playoffs the way they are dominating on the field. The volleyball team continues to impress with their athleticism and also looks to make a deep run. The XC team members have continued to improve as the year has gone on with many runners achieving personal bests again and again. The soccer team has made great improvements and is looking like a team that can beat anybody. The girl's golf team finished the regular season strong and Kenzie Fleck represented SCFHS well by making it all the way to sectionals. The dance team has entertained large crowds at the football games and the homecoming parade and will begin the competition season soon. The drama department is hard at work preparing the cast and crew to present *Shrek, The Musical*, with shows November 14-17.

Our new staff have acclimated well and are fitting in with our high school teaching team nicely. Katie Tietz (physical education and health) will be helping coach girls basketball and track/field. This year we have instituted a new Academic and Career Planning (ACP) process. All high school students are assigned to an advisor who they will meet with once per month to work on post-secondary goals and future planning. Throughout the year students will utilize different tools, applications, and websites such as Xello, designed to help with career exploration. Ask your student to show you their Xello work. Students are working on career exploration, resume writing, college searches, and financial literacy to name a few of the topics.

SCFHS recognized as an AP Pacesetter school!

For the past ten-plus years, the Pacesetter Award from the the Wisconsin Advanced Placement Advisory Council (WAPAC) and the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction has recognized high-performing AP schools in the state. In 2023, 151 schools earned special recognition for their work engaging students in advanced coursework and acknowledging student performance on AP exams. Pacesetter Awards are a celebration of excellence from across our state. According to The College Board, “AP students, including those with average scores of 1 or 2, are more likely to enroll in a 4-year college, compared to academically similar students who didn’t take AP in high school.” By these metrics, we know that Pacesetter schools are doing important work to prepare students to be college and career ready.

What makes a Pacesetter school?

Pacesetter schools are acknowledged for their efforts at one of three levels:

- Level 1: 30% or more of all student participation in at least one AP exam and 70% or more earning scores of 3 or above on the exams.
- Level 2: 20% or more of all student participation in at least one AP exam and 65% or more earning scores of 3 or above on the exams.
- Level 3: 10% or more of all student participation in at least one AP exam and 60% or more earning scores of 3 or above on the exams.

St. Croix Falls High School met the Level 2 criteria!

Of the 151 schools that met criteria to be a Level 1, 2, or 3 Pacesetter:

- 24 schools were at Level 1
- 37 schools were at Level 2
- 90 schools were at Level 3

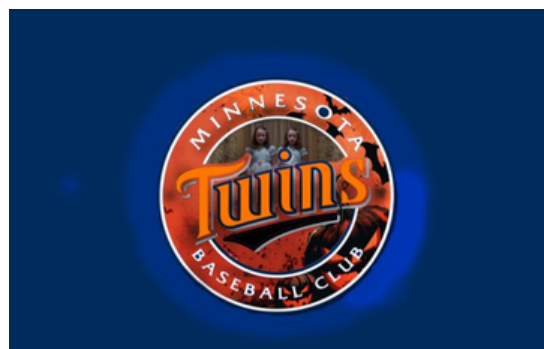
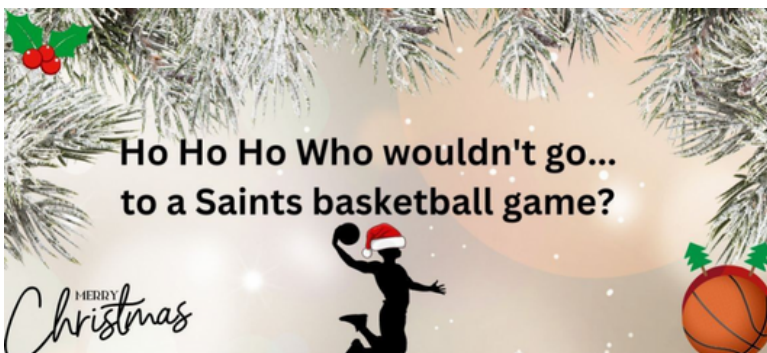
Rotary Student of the Month

The public is invited to the District-wide Veterans Day Program on November 11th at 9 am in the High School Gym. At this program, our area veterans will be celebrated and the St. Croix Falls Veterans Wall of Honor will be dedicated. Three years in the making, the Wall acknowledges St. Croix Falls graduates who have joined the Armed Forces. The 14x40ft Wall was designed locally by Sign Xpress and is located in the high school cafeteria. A 5x7 picture of each nominated graduate who joined the military will be placed on the Wall. A special portion of the Wall is dedicated to the seven graduates who gave their lives for their country. Respect SELF

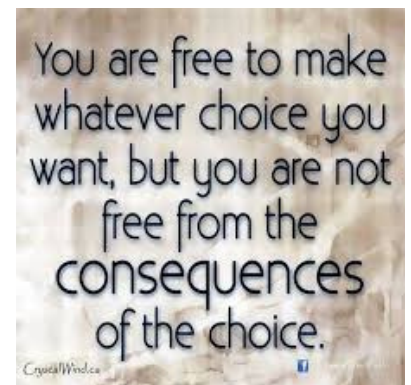
- Make good decisions today for a successful tomorrow.

Classwork and assessments contribute to overall grades, with seventh and eighth graders' assessments counting for 70% and daily work for 30%. For fifth and sixth graders, assessments count for 60% and daily work for 40%. If you have questions about your child's grades, please contact their teacher directly.

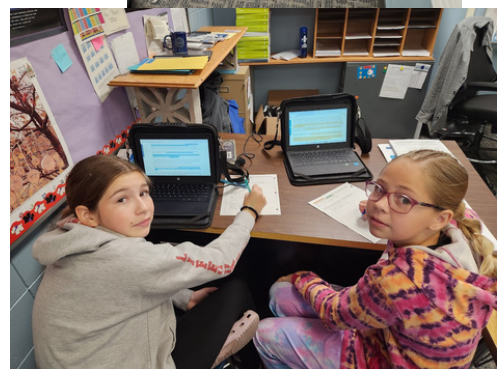
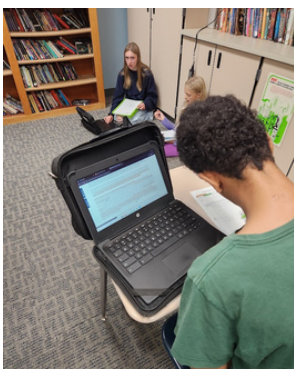

School-Home Collaboration

- Communicate with us! Please check your ClassTag, bookmark the elementary schools' webpage (<https://www.scf.k12.wi.us/schools/scf/>) and share your updated email information. This year more than ever, we need an electronic means of communication.
- If there is a change in transportation ALWAYS write a note or call the office directly. ClassTag, email, and other communication systems do not work for changes in transportation.

Please remember, we need you as much as you need us. We serve children best when we try to be on the same page. Reach out with questions, concerns, and suggestions when you have them. Attendance Reminders

We love our students and want to see their smiling faces as often as possible! This year, we encourage you to make good attendance a goal.

Building the Attendance Habit

Getting back into the habit of daily attendance matters more than ever as we recover from the pandemic.

Going to school every day is an opportunity to:

- Build routines that will be useful for the rest of life.
- Help reduce stress because students don't always feel "out of the loop".
- Connect to friends and teachers and build support systems and a sense of belonging.
- Engage in learning and stay at or above grade level.

Often parents don't realize how quickly absences add up and what a profound effect they can have on a child's life. When students miss two days a month it may not seem like much but it quickly adds up to almost a full month of learning loss!

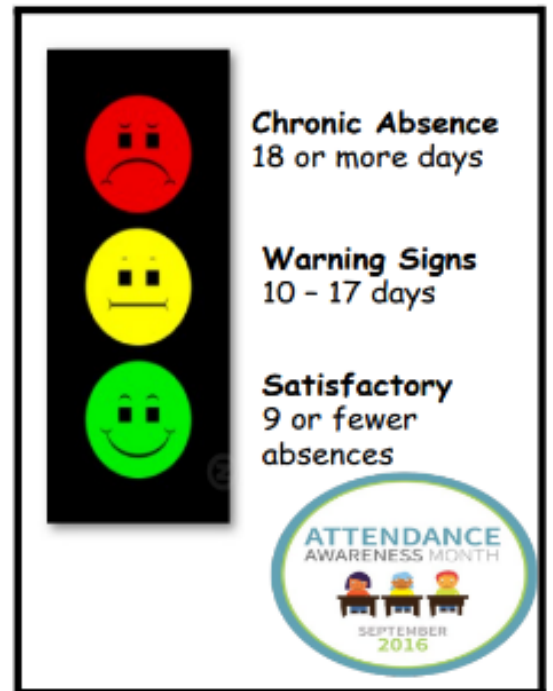
Thoughts to Consider:

- Keeping a student home when she or he has a fever is ALWAYS the right thing to do.
- Keeping a student home when she or he has a slight runny nose or cough may not be necessary.
- When students are frequently absent (more than once or twice a month) the teacher needs to devote more time to "catching up" and that means a loss of teaching time for all children.
- Students who are frequently absent are more likely to be significantly below grade level in reading and math and that has far-reaching effects.

When Your Kiddo Doesn't Want to Go

Sometimes our children (mine included!), don't want to go to school. That is normal! I love my job to the moon and back and sometimes I still don't want to go to work! The call of a cozy day at home can be tempting. But, I promise you, once your children are here, they tend to be happy, even if they put on a strong fuss at home in the morning. Below are tips to help your child get up and head to school each morning.

- Make sure that you share with them how important school is. Never give your child the idea that school is optional.
- Remind your child about how much fun they have with their friends.



ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

- When your child comes home from school, ask her/him to tell you about something fun or funny that happened. Help your kiddos focus on how great it is to be in a community each day.
- Set a routine with an early bedtime. Most American children do not get nearly enough sleep. Elementary school children need between 9 and 12 hours of sleep each night!
- Don't allow electronics of any kind for at least an hour before bed.
- Read with your child for at least 20 minutes before bed.
- Build a routine for mornings with a set wake-up time and breakfast.

We work hard to make our school environment a place where everyone can be safe, happy, healthy and learning. Please reach out if you need help with attendance or building routines. We will do our best to listen and partner with you so that our children have a successful year.

FOOD SERVICES

Research shows that when students eat a healthy breakfast, academic performance, attendance, and behavior all improve. All students deserve the chance to start their day with the fuel they need to do well in school. However, many children and adolescents in Wisconsin do not start their day with a healthy breakfast. School breakfast provides a healthy start to the day for everybody, provides students with a healthy meal of fruits, whole grains, and dairy, and can be a time saver for families, making mornings less rushed.

The National School Lunch Program sets the rules for daily meals. Breakfast and lunch have different rules, this is so we can provide nutritionally balanced meals each school day. For breakfast at St. Croix Falls, the food service staff offers at least 4 breakfast items. Students must select at least 3 items which includes one 1/2 cup fruit.

The national school food regulations state that 5 cups of fruit or juice weekly (juice can only be 1/2 cup of the fruit provided) or 1 cup of fruit daily for all K-12 students must be served. This means the SCFSD offers 1/2 cup of regular fruit like 1 orange, 1 apple, 1/4 cup raisins (box) or cranberries (container) or 4 oz scoop of canned or fresh fruit plus 4 oz or 1/2 cup of 100% juice, and it must come in at the correct calorie levels and be low in fat and salt!

For students K-8th grade, 8 servings or ounces of meat or meat alternative or whole grain per week, at least 1oz daily, must be provided. The breakfast calorie limits are 400-500 calories, less than 10 grams of saturated fat and less than 540 mg of sodium.

For student 9-12, 9 servings must be offered per week, at least 1 serving daily. High school breakfast calorie limits are 450-600 calories, also less than 10 grams of saturated fat and sodium of below 640 mg of sodium.

2 kinds of 8 oz milk are served at St. Croix Falls; skim chocolate and 1% white milk.

We try to make it simple for our student, offering a variety of fruits, grains and meat alternative. This is called Offer vs Serve. Kids can pick 3 different items but at least one item must be 1/2 cup fruit. Breakfast meal pattern consists of three food items:

- 1 cup Fruit/Vegetable
- 1 to 2 oz of whole Grains or Meat/Meat Alternates (yogurt, cheese, eggs etc.)
- Fluid Milk (1% white or fat-free flavored)

1st Breakfast is served to all Middle School student from 7:30 to 8:00 am.

The HS School may eat at this breakfast time, or it is also offered at 9:30 AM (2nd Chance breakfast).

This allows students the chance to eat when they are hungry.

The same rules apply.

Our athletes are having amazing success in competition but here are some fall highlights outside their amazing athletic accomplishments.

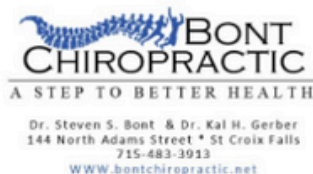

TOO Sick for School? When to Stay Home.

1. Fever: 100.4 F or greater. Student may return to school when fever-free for 24 hours without using any fever reducing medications.
2. Vomiting/Diarrhea: Any unexplained vomiting episode. May return 24 hours after last episode. Diarrhea=three or more unexplained episodes of watery or loose stool in 24 hours OR sudden onset of loose stools. May return 24 hours after last episode.
3. Cough: Serious, sustained coughing, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing. Consult with a health care provider.
4. Rash: Any new rash accompanied by fever. May return after rash goes away and fever free or clearance given by health care provider.
5. Skin Lesions/Sores: Drainage from a sore that cannot be contained within a bandage OR sores are increasing in size OR new sores are developing day-to-day. Consult with a health care provider

Information on Head Lice

An estimated 6 to 12 million infestations occur each year in the United States, most often among children ages 3 to 11 years of age. It is a good idea to check your child's hair frequently.

Head lice are not dangerous. They do not transmit disease, but they spread easily. Head lice are tiny, wingless insects that live close to the human scalp and feed on human blood. The eggs (nits) are tiny, tear-drop shaped; and attach to the hair shaft and are often found around the nap of the neck or ears. Nits may appear yellowish or white and can look similar to dandruff. But, unlike dandruff, they can be difficult to remove. Baby lice (nymphs) are smaller and grow to adult size in 1-2 weeks. Adult lice are the size of a sesame seed and are tan to grayish-white. Lice crawl, they do not fly or jump.

Infestation can occur at home, school or in the community. Head lice are mostly spread by direct head to head contact – for example, during play at home or school, slumber parties, sports activities or camp. Sometimes, head lice are spread via objects that were in recent contact with a person infected by head lice, such as hats scarves, combs, brushes, hair attachments, etc. It is very important to check your students hair throughout the school year.



HEAD LICE TREATMENT RECOMMENDATIONS

- Examine each family member's head. A magnifying glass in good light may help. Wash your hands between examinations.
- Consult with your doctor or go to the pharmacy for a lice killing product. Follow the directions on the labels or inserts of the medicated product.
- Promptly treat all members of the family who have head lice. Follow the product directions exactly!!! If your child has very thick or long hair, 2 treatment packages may be needed.
- Each head lice treatment product is different and instructions vary. It is EXTREMELY important to follow the directions included with the product you choose to use.
- Some lice killing products are applied to dry hair. If the lice killing product recommends shampooing hair prior to use, do not use a combination shampoo/conditioner or conditioner.
- Lice killing products should be applied and rinsed at a sink, not in the shower or bathtub, to avoid unnecessary chemical exposure. Protect the neck, ears, and face with a dry towel. Make sure the child is comfortable as this process takes several minutes.
- Do not wash the hair for 1-2 days after treatment for lice.
- It is not necessary, but hair can be combed with a fine-tooth nit comb or tweezers to remove all nits (eggs).
- Remove mattress pads, sheets, pillowcases, and blankets from beds. Wash and dry on hot setting
- Put pillows, non-washable bedding, stuffed toys, furniture throw pillows, etc. in a dryer set on hot for 30 minutes; or seal them on a plastic bag for 7-14 days.
- Make beds with clean linen.
- Thoroughly vacuum all mattresses, upholstered furniture, carpet, car seats, and seats in the car/s, especially around buttons.
- Wash all jackets, sweaters, hats, and other clothing that may have come in contact with head lice in the last 3-4 days.
- Take non-washable clothing to the dry cleaners or use an alternative treatment: dyer for 30 minutes or seal in plastic bag for 7-14 days.
- Notify all people who were in contact with any family member with head lice in the past week. Inform them, they must check for head lice/nits, treat persons with head lice/nits and do thorough house cleaning. This step is important to avoid re-infestation.
- Many products require another treatment in 7 to 10 days. Check product inserts or labels for details.
- Do not use the product more often than the directions state. Do not use the product to prevent head lice. The risk is developing immunity to the product.



HOW TO EXAMINE FOR HEAD LICE

Use bright light to look at:

- 1 Crown of head
- 2 Bangs
- 3 Behind both ears
- 4 Nape of neck

How to inspect

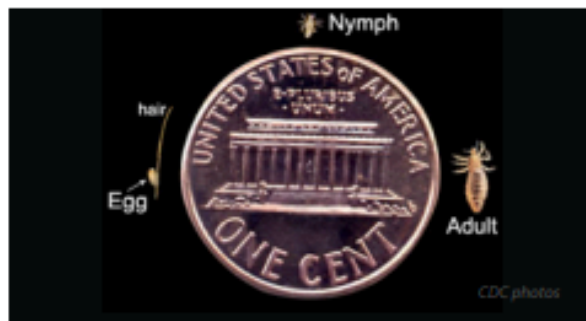
- 1 Place gloves on your hands
- 2 Use fingers to separate hair and create a part. The part should allow you to clearly see the person's scalp.
- 3 Look for lice crawling on the scalp where the hair is parted or on the hair shaft. The lice will be dark in color and the size of a poppyseed.
- 4 Look for nits near hair follicle about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch from scalp. Nits (eggs) will be white or yellowish-brown. Nits are often more easily seen than lice, especially when the person has dark hair.
- 5 Also look behind both ears and near the back of the neck. You may see lice

SCREENING TIP:

To distinguish between dandruff and nits, try to flick or pull off the white speck. Dandruff is easily pulled off, but nits are not.

Change gloves between each child's examination and wash your hands after all examinations are completed.
